HALF/FULL DAY VISITS TO NGAMBA ISLAND CHIMP SANCTUARY



Ngamba Island Chimpanzee Sanctuary is situated off the shore of Entebbe on Lake Victoria. The 100-acre island is tropical-like and is the home to approximately 29 orphaned chimpanzees, which are free to roam the forest being run by the Jane Goodall Foundation. Fast speed boat transfer, and entrance fees for chimp viewing from a feeding platform, is included. (Do not enter enclosure or touch chimps).

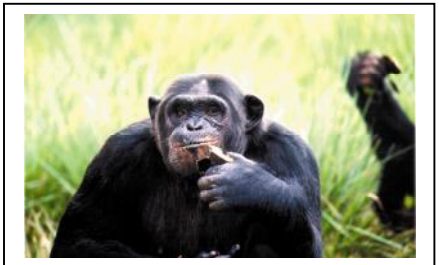

NGAMBA ISLAND-OVERNIGHT TRIP



24 hour trip includes meals prepared by the cook, tented accommodation, boat transfers and camping & viewing fees for chimps.

On this stay you may do an optional forest walk with the juveniles. If you are interested in the forest walks an extra US \$350 per person (maximum of three people) will be charged for this activity. Payable onsite in Uganda.

FULL DAY BOTANICAL GARDENS AND BIRD WALK



Visit the tombs in Kampala, take a bird walk along the shores of Lake Victoria and finish with a tour to the wonderful Botanical gardens where you may see black and white Colobus monkey.

KIBALE FOREST

An early start to meet your guide and enter the forest in search of chimpanzees and ten other primate species including red colobus monkey, blues, red tails and grey-cheeked mangabey.

CHIMP WALK IN KIBALE FOREST: This is an easy walk on well marked trails in this beautiful rain forest where there is very little undergrowth due to the full canopy overhead. Even though considered easy, it is advisable to wear trekking boots and have rain gear available. Lasting for three to five hours the main objective is to see chimps in their natural habitat, often in the tree tops feeding and if lucky on the ground, or even a chance to observe the chimps hunting colobus. These are 100% wild chimps that are now habituated and tolerate humans in their territory.

The forest is home to 10 other primate species, some of which may be seen on the walk. The forest is interesting in all aspects of flora and fauna and the local guides are excellent in relaying information to visitors.

Continue on a second chimp walk this afternoon.

In addition to escorted walks, the park offers a full-day *Chimpanzee Experience*. Depart from camp early in the morning and join up with the research team who are involved with the habituation and research of a separate chimp group. The program starts at 6:00am, spending the entire day with the family group of chimpanzees, observing them waking up, feeding, playing, resting up and even building their nests allowing guests to observe the chimps. This program needs to be booked in advance and is not always available.



MURCHISON FALLS - KANIYO PABIDI FOREST

Enroute to Murchison Falls is the Kaniyo Pabidi Forest where a chimpanzee family has recently been habituated with help from the Jane Goodall Foundation. On a recent visit in November 2010 we stopped there for lunch and the park rangers advised that the resident chimp family were very close – maybe 15-20 minutes. After a mere 10 minutes we found the family of 30 chimps in a huge fig tree and spent a very enjoyable hour watching them up in the trees and down on the ground in the shade. They amused us with their cavorting and screeching as they played and chased each other. What a great start to our safari!
